Extractive Realities and Ecological Resonances 1-12 July 2024 Athens

This two week summer school merges traditional art with modern technology, offering a curriculum that explores Seoul's and cinema. Participants engage in creative processes, fostering a community that appreciates diverse artistic expresrarv culture.

> Rituals In Teletopia — Practices in **Telematic Performances** 26 August-4 September 2024 Singapore, Taipei, and Zurich

In this interdisciplinary course students from various disciplinary backgrounds get the chance to collaborate and create a performance across remote stages in hub locations (Zurich, Singapore, Taipei). Students will explore the aesthetics, narmatic immersive performance-making through learning techniques in staging, scoring, improvisation, and performance art.

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Title: Extractive Realities and Ecological Resonances Dates: 1-12 July 2024 Location: Athens

Extractivism describes processes of resource exploitation, where humans take from the earth, in its material substance, its treatment of peoples, and the prevailing value systems of profit and growth. Extractivist practices have an enormous impact on environmental, political, and social systems as well as cultural and creative responses. Sited in and around Athens — the city where democracy is thought to be born and an important node in the network of global trade — this summer school invites students to investigate and map extractivist processes in Aspropyrgos and Elefsina (industrial towns in the north of Athens.) as well as struggling farming lands and the site of the ancient Eleusinian Mysteries.

Participants will develop and test creative tools to critically respond to the complexity of what defines extractivism beyond its purely material effects. Invisible manifestations and broader ramifications will be explored: on the land, human and other-than-human inhabitants, wider ecosystems, and the cultures it disrupts. Through field work, encounters and experimental studio practice, collaborative mapping of the supply chains (local/national/planetary), geologies (temporality/deep time/entropy), futures (projection/speculations/prediction), and extractive effects (cultural and ecological implications, scales) will be translated into artistic responses. The twoweek intensive programme will conclude with public outcomes.

Title: The Embedded Artist Dates: 5-7 August 2024 (online) 12-23 August 2024 (face to face) Location: Zurich

Artists embedded in social realities often try to give attention to perspectives that are marginalised, little heard or even silenced by those in power. This opens fields of ambiguity and contradiction. In close connection with people and other living beings from diverse social fields, artists generate alternative knowledge(s) relevant for future coexistence through "epistemic disobedience" (Whitehead 2018) and are thus part of decolonisation movements.

Such framing provokes to see artists as leaders of change and to rethink the function of the arts in a civic society at a moment in time in which the systems are failing, including environmental, economic, and social structures.

The summer school participants will engage with 'places of embeddedness'. They will live and work in small teams in a specific socio-cultural field. They assist at everyday labour, talk to diverse people, observe, listen, and collect. At the end of the two weeks artistic try-outs are opened to an external audience. "Places of embeddedness" could be a retirement home, a food bank for the homeless, a permaculture farm or accommodation for asylum seekers.

Participants receive input from the lecturers on diverse perspectives to approaching and positioning themselves in social fields, working out relevant topics, translating them into artistic formats, critical self-reflection, and responsibilities after the end of a project. Theoretical points of reference for this are concepts of "Unlearning", "Participation", "Postcolonial Pedagogy".


